Thursday: ***The Son of God Has Set Us Free from Sin and Death by His Grace***

“Wisdom is justified by her deeds” (Matt. 11:19), and the true Wisdom of God, Christ Jesus the incarnate Son, justifies us by His deeds. He prepares His way by the preaching of repentance, but He has suffered the violence of the Law and voluntarily handed Himself over to violent men, that we might eat and drink with Him in His Kingdom and *“remain in the house forever”* (John 8:35). For He is *“a friend of tax collectors and sinners”* (Matt. 11:19), and He has rescued us by His grace from the slavery of sin and death. By the proclamation of His eternal Gospel *“to those who dwell on earth, to every nation and tribe and language and people”* (Rev. 14:6), *“the righteousness of God has been manifested apart from the law”* (Rom. 3:21), *“that He might be just and the justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus”* (Rom. 3:26). And by hearing the Gospel of Christ Jesus, *“whom God put forward as a propitiation by His blood, to be received by faith”* (Rom. 3:25), *“you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free”* (John 8:31–32).

Catechism for the Week: The Close of the Commandments

The Close of the Commandments: What does God say about all these commandments? He says: “I, the Lord your God, am a jealous God, punishing the children for the sin of the fathers to the third and fourth generation of those who hate Me, but showing love to a thousand generations of those who love Me and keep My commandments.” [Ex. 20:5-6]

What does this mean? God threatens to punish all who break these commandments. Therefore, we should fear His wrath and not do anything against them. But He promises grace and every blessing to all who keep these commandments. Therefore, we should also love and trust in Him and gladly do what He commands.

Lord God, heavenly Father, I thank You for Your abundant mercy and steadfast love in inviting me through Your dear Word to come to the glad wedding feast, and by Your Son forgiving me all my sins. But because daily tribulations, offenses, and dangers are so numerous, and we for our own part are very weak and inclined to sin, I beseech You by Your Holy Spirit graciously to keep me from all calamity. But should I fall and defile my garment which Your beloved Son, Jesus Christ, put on me, graciously restore me, lead me to genuine repentance and true faith in Your mercy, and never let me fall. Amen.
