Looking forward to the First Sunday after Christmas

Monday: Isaiah 11:1-5

Tuesday: Galatians 4:1-7

Wednesday: Luke 2:22-40

Thursday: A rod has come forth from the stem of Jesse (Is. 11:1-5)—the seed of David whose kingdom shall be established forever (II Sam. 7:1-16). In the fullness of time, God sent forth His Son Jesus to redeem us from the judgment of the Law (Gal. 4:1-7). Now He is presented in the temple in fulfillment of the Law and revealed to be “*a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and for glory to your people Israel*” (Luke 2:22-40). Christ has enlightened us in baptism, giving us to be adopted as sons of God and heirs of eternal life. Receiving the Holy Sacrament of His body and blood, we are prepared to depart this world in peace, for our eyes have seen the salvation of God in Him.

Catechism for the Week: Sixth Petition of the Lord’s Prayer

What is the Sixth Petition? And lead us not into temptation.

What does this mean? God tempts no one. We pray in this petition that God would guard and keep us so that the devil, the world, and our sinful nature may not deceive us or mislead us into false belief, despair, and other great shame and vice. Although we are attacked by these things, we pray that we may finally overcome them and win the victory.
