From the Desk of Pastor Conradt

"Into All the World' Begins Here"

Children of God, we had a great kick-off to our 160th anniversary celebration. On Sunday Jan 21st we had Bible Study/ Sunday School, we celebrated the Transfiguration of Our Lord, and shared a meal with each other. Thank you to all in attendance. Thank you especially to our Board of Parish Fellowship for putting it together. I am excited to see what the Lord has in store for us this year and into the future.

Our goal this year is to come together and reengage the place where our Lord has planted us. 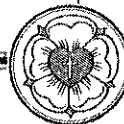

FAMILY MOVIE NIGHT



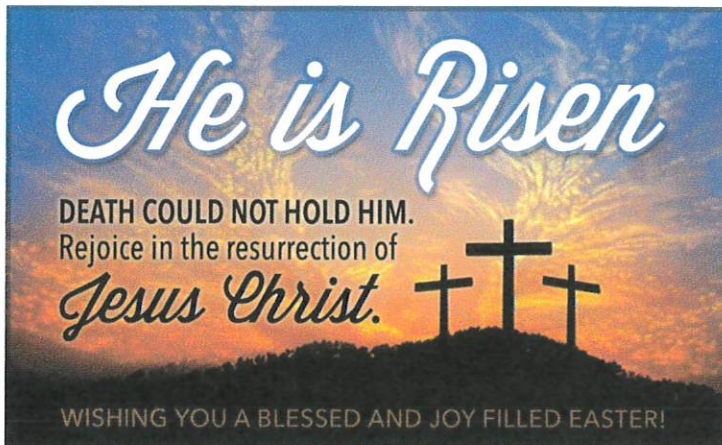

Excerpt from 150th Anniversary booklet

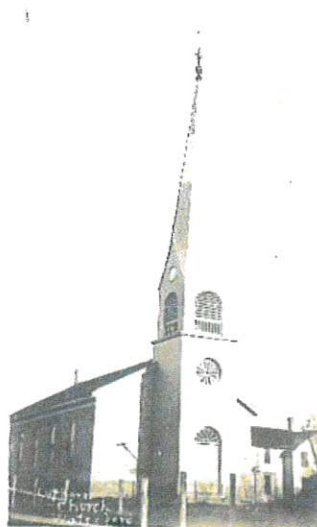
To get a full and clear understanding of the beginning of our congregation, we need to go back to the year of 1847, at a time that Wisconsin was still part of the Territory of Michigan. It was then that 23 pastors, 6 laymen, and 1 candidate of theology met in Chicago at the First Lutheran Church. During this first meeting of the Missouri Synod a plea for a pastor was made by 2 laymen. J.D. Beversdorf and C. Kauffung representing Trinity of Milwaukee & Trinity of Freistadt respectively. Mentioned in their plea were the many Lutheran settlements that were without a pastor. The Synod therefore, resolved to send a theological candidate in the area. C. Fincke was chosen.

On December 8, 1849, the Evangelical Lutheran Ministerium of Wisconsin (Wisconsin Synod) was formed in Milwaukee. The final organization took place in May 1850 at Granville, WI. While the Missouri Synod was working in Milwaukee and other areas of the state, the southeastern section was served by the Wisconsin Synod.

Ten years prior to the actual organization of our congregation, small groups of Lutheran's living in and around Waterford began holding worship services. It is known that since 1857 the Rev. Goldhammer, pastor of St. John's in Burlington, occasionally came to the village of Waterford to conduct worship. The actual place where the services were held is not known. It

may have been in one of the homes of the early settlers, in the schoolhouse, or occasionally at the Norway Lutheran Church. After Pastor Goldhammer left Burlington, Rev. Titze came to St. John's and like his predecessor; he took care of the Waterford group.

As the Waterford group grew in number and interest under Pastor Titze, plans were made for the erection of their own church. The one which the new church would stand was purchased from Bemis & Whitney of Janesville for less than \$50.00 in one of the first Wisconsin land sales. Early in 1863 plans were made for the new church and construction was started in the fall. By spring of 1864 the First Lutheran Church of Waterford was completed.

RECIPE CORNER

Cheesy Potatoes with Smoked Sausage

- 1 pkg Hillshire Farm Smoked Sausage
- 1 bag (20 oz) refrigerated shredded hash brown potatoes
- 2 cups (8 oz) shredded cheddar cheese
- 1 cup sour cream
- 1 medium onion (chopped)
- ¼ cup butter or margarine (melted)
- ¼ teaspoon ground black pepper

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly spray a 13 by 9 inch baking pan with nonstick cooking spray. Cut sausage into ½ inch cubs. Combine all ingredients in a large bowl.

Spread mixture evenly in prepared pan. Bake 40 – 45 minutes or until lightly browned. Let stand 5 minutes before serving.



Organist Notes



For this article, I am going to spend a little time talking about special organ music, specifically the prelude. I am sure most of you know what the prelude is, the music that I play for a couple minutes before church starts. But there is a lot more to it than just background music.

The word prelude comes from the Latin word “Praeludium”, which itself is a combination of two Latin words, “prae”, which means before, and “ludere”, which means to play. Historically, the prelude was just a piece of music that was played before a greater work, such as an organ sonata or toccata, or even a symphony. In the church, the prelude was originally a short introduction to the hymns that the congregation would sing, usually an improvised piece with the hymn melody woven throughout. Today, in many churches, the prelude is usually just ten minutes of organ music before the service starts, and in some churches, may not even be sacred music but secular music that the congregation may unfortunately be more familiar with.

And so, what is the real purpose of the prelude? To some organists, it may be just to fill awkward silences or provide background music while people chat. And to be honest, that is somewhat what my approach had been over the past 5 years. However, recently my goal has changed. My approach to prelude selection has become much more purposeful, for a couple of reasons. The first of these is historical. My prelude now serves to introduce either the hymn of the day, the entrance hymn, or utilizes an organ piece which historically was used with the liturgical theme or overall season. For example, my prelude for Ash Wednesday will be Mendelssohn’s Sonata in A Major, which utilizes the hymn tune *Aus Tiefer Not*, the tune for LSB 607 “From Depths of Woe I Cry to Thee”, which is the hymn of the day. Sometimes, this prelude may also be used to introduce a hymn tune that the congregation may be less familiar with, such as *St. Patrick’s Breastplate*, which is the hymn tune for “I Bind Unto Myself This Day” (LSB 604).

Another purpose for the prelude is to allow a time for people to prepare for the service. Some good things to do during the prelude are to pray, read and meditate on the lessons for the day, and prepare their hearts for the service. There are is an excellent prayer to prepare for worship on the inside cover of our hymnal.

With this differing approach to the prelude recently, you may have noticed several changes. First, you will notice that the title of the prelude will often be listed in the bulletin. Sometimes this title will explicitly list the hymn that it is based on. Other times, it may only be a hymn tune. In this case, feel free to look up the hymn tune in the back of the bulletin to see which hymn the tune is based on. Secondly, the prelude might start only three or four minutes before the service. This allows time for people to arrive and get seated (and maybe even chat a little) before the prelude starts. And since the prelude flows right into the service, it may even run a minute or two long. This is just extra time to prepare for worship!

And so, the prelude, which is really the first part of the worship service, serves to introduce the hymns, teach less familiar tunes, and allow the congregation to prepare for worship. These are just some of my thoughts on church music, and so if anyone has any questions, or has suggestions for other topics I can write about, feel free to talk to me after the service.

Funding Our Final Mission Grants!

Grant #11 SOS Center – Designed for Success \$20,000 - This social service agency, located at 4620 W North Ave in Milwaukee, has served youth and their families since 1982 when it first opened. That makes 40 years of sharing the love of Christ with those who come through their doors. The after school program helps with homework and provides a safe and loving environment and the Born to Lead because Christ Leads Us group works with high school and young adults in leadership training. The grant reassures the staff and volunteers that what they do is important. They wish to expand and add a focused group for young ladies, Irreplaceable Gems, through which they will learn to love and respect themselves because they are children of God. A grief support group for children and youth is also a need they wish to address.

Grant #12 Hispanic Outreach Sheboygan County - Communication and Ministry Partnership \$11,060 - Over seven years ago, visionaries in Sheboygan County conceived a plan to reach out to the growing Hispanic community in their midst. Many churches and individuals got on board to support this ministry since it involves the specialized preaching/teaching in the language of the people. The outreach has resulted in a flourishing congregation meeting weekly for Bible Study and service in Spanish. Newcomers have been catechized and children baptized. The vision now is to continue and expand on this beginning but it will take new sources of revenue to provide financial support and prayers. This grant is instrumental in developing the visual message that will be shared, and for the training of local persons to carry on the work of spreading the message of the Hispanic Outreach with the goal of securing support for many years to come.

Grant Recipients Express Thanks!

Now that we are nearing the end of the 2022–24 grant cycle, it is good to be reminded that our mites turn into acts of mercy by the agencies that receive them. We ask that grant recipients let us know what happens with those dollars. Here are snippets of those reports.

Bethany Lutheran Church in Milwaukee found the timing for their grant to be “at the right time.” Their aged building experienced some structural damage needing repair to the main entrance into the building. “This grant money allows Bethany to continue reaching out to Milwaukee’s inner city, the Burmese congregation who uses our building for worship, and the people from the House of Correction, as Pastor Afam (Ikanih) invites them to join our Bible studies and worship.” They have successfully hosted two block parties over the summer, bearing witness to the scope of God’s all-encompassing love for their neighbors.

The Wisconsin branch of **Orphan Grain Train** received \$15,000 early in the cycle. “This year most of the money was used to ship food and aid over to the Ukraine! As you know, this war has been daunting and relentless.” OGT ships to pastors and missionaries who receive them and who distribute, giving them opportunities to reach into the lives of people around them to share the good news of Jesus Christ! Their report further states, “Please relay our deepest gratitude to the LWML for their love and service to those in need. This organization, the LWML, is amazing!”

Doxology - Care for Clergy Wives was recently fully funded in the amount of \$8,000! More information on how these funds will impact their ministry will be shared soon.

And finally, the **SOS Center** in Milwaukee is about to receive the full amount (instead of partial) of their request. Lydia Beasley commented...“please pass a thank you to all

This has been a very full year, and we are just a couple of months away from a new year to come. I can truly say that the LWML Milwaukee Convention was the highlight of my summer.

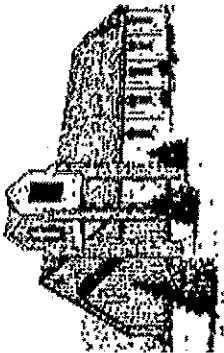

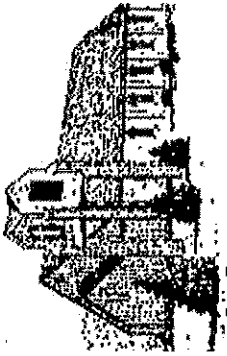
