#### From the Desk of Pastor Conradt

The Responsibility of Members

"Closed Communion"

The following is copied from p. 304 of Lutheran Catechesis by Rev. Peter C. Bender, which I use for Youth and Adult Catechesis. Why closed communion?

"To commune at a church's altar is to say "AMEN" to the faith that is thought and confessed in that church. Members of a Lutheran congregation should not commune in other churches who do not share their confession of faith. It is not the faith of the communicant that makes the Sacrament a sacrament, but the Word of Christ that is faithfully preached and administered in that place It is false for a Christian to conclude, "I know what the Sacrament is in my heart, so even if this church teaches something different, I'm going to commune there anyway." This dishonors Christ and does not give witness to the fact that it is His Word alone that makes the Sacrament what it is. When Christians do this they are relying upon the thoughts and feelings of their own hearts, rather than upon the Word of Christ. The only ground of certainty for faith is in Christ's objective Word. When Christians commune "willy-nilly" in congregations of church bodies which do not confess their faith, they are saying that the teachings of Christ do not matter. The Word of God gives a strict warning in this regard: "Whoever transgresses and does not abide in the doctrine of Christ does not have God. He who abides in the doctrine of Christ has both the Father and the Son. If anyone comes to you and does not bring this doctrine, do not receive him into your house nor greet him; for he who greets him shares in his evil deeds" (II John 1:9-11). This is why church fellowship is important. We are united with churches who faithfully confess the Gospel of Christ, for it is the Gospel alone that sustains faith.

"When Christians visit sister con-

gregations within their synod, it is proper to announce to the pastor the desire to commune at the Lord's Table in that congregation before approaching the altar. Members of the congregation should also assist visitors who come with them to the Divine Service. They should know and understand why closed Communion is practiced. They should make arrangements for their visitor to speak with the pastor before the Divine Service. Members should take the initiative to contact their pastor in advance of the Divine Service, so that an adequate time for consultation can be arranged. This is very important, particularly if there is a question in the mind of the member concerning the "worthy reception" of that visitor at the Lord's Table. If the visitor is a repeat visitor and known to the pastor, individual discussions may not be necessary each time. Circumstances and knowledge of the visitor will determine the extent of the pastor's examination. The pastor will take great care in training the elders and ushers in the congregation, so that they can assist him in the faithful administration of the Sacrament.

"Closed Communion is the ancient practice of the Church. Though often misunderstood, it is born out of love for Christ and every potential communicant. It is the practice of responsible spiritual care that ensures health to the whole body and each individual member of Christ.





#### ~RECIPE CORNER~

No-Knead Bread

Ingredients: 3 cups all-purpose flour

1 ½ tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. instant yeast

1 ½ cups room temp water

#### Instructions:

- 1. Mix ingredients, cover, and rest 12-18 hours.
- 2. Preheat oven to 450° with a 6-8 qt. pot inside.
- 3. Shape dough, place in pot, and bake 30 min covered.
- 4. Remove lid, bake 10-15 minutes more.
- 5. Remove bread from pot and cool on rack.



We give thanks to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, praying always for you, since we heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of your love for all the saints; because of the hope which is laid up for you in heaven, of which you heard before in the word of the truth of the gospel, which has come to you, as it has also in all the world, and is bringing forth fruit, as it is also among you since the day you heard and knew the grace of God in truth. Colossians 1:3-6

I'm new here at St. Peter's (since last August), and I'm thankful for all who have been so welcoming to my family and myself. *Rooted in Christ, Growing in Faith* was the slogan of the 150th year celebration at St. Peter's. Having celebrated our 160th last year, now is a good time to prayerfully consider what God may have in store for the future of St. Peter's. At least twice over the last 160 years, St. Peter's has had a school - at its inception and from 1999 - 2011 (most recently).

A classical Lutheran school is one that centers on Christ and the message of the Gospel, connects to ancient (Greco-Roman and Medieval) history and literature, and seeks mastery of academic knowledge and skills for the students. What could it look like at St. Peter's? It could look like a small school with multi-grade classrooms. A small staff (using mostly current staff) that focuses on solid academic basics, uses classics, teaches Latin, and leads children into the deep mysteries of God through Holy Scriptures. Delving into the church's and Western Civilization's history while all the time making sure that students can read, write, recite, and are learning foundation concepts and skills. Here's an example of subjects often taught at a classical school.

As you learned from Pastor's recent month's newsletter, "All students are trained in accuracy, attention to detail, and mastery." Mastery means that students are trained on valuable content that continually builds on what they already know and have learned. It's a way of thinking that provides a foundation for life. Classical schools focus on truth, goodness and beauty. The truth is always based on Christ. This world's philosophies are considered (in the middle school when their brains are ready), but always in light of the eternal truth proclaimed in God's word. Goodness proceeds from God's attributes and His work in the world. Helping students understand the social emotional relationships they experience in light of God's will and word is important. Beauty shines forth from God's eternal beauty and shines out in all kinds of ways as we see what God has done through His creating and redeeming word, and with His hand in all of history.

This month I've touched on a little of WHAT it could be here at St. Peter's to gauge interests and to ask questions. In March, I'll share a little of HOW a classical school operates and how it could look at our facility. **Thank you for your support** of the Preschool. We are up to 9 students this month, adding a 10th in February, and are enrolling for Fall 2025.



# Life Shines in Darkness





The 1993 blockbuster film Jurassic Park didn't just spawn dinosaurs. It also gave us two of the most poignant sanctity of life affirmations in popular culture. Dr. Ian Malcolm, a chaos theorist played by Jeff Goldblum, laments that "Scientists were so preoccupied with whether or not they could, they didn't stop to think if they should." And the same character appreciates how "Life, uh, finds a way."

Nobody can deny that life issues involve difficulties. Surprise pregnancy and terminal diagnosis bring significant suffering. Bearing a child is hard. Injury, illness, and impairment hurt. They impose and deprive. Feeling afraid, ashamed, impoverished, abused, or abandoned sometimes complicates the circumstances. Even Jesus recognizes the reality: "When a woman is giving birth, she has sorrow because her hour has come" (John 16:21). "In the world," He goes on to acknowledge, "you will have trouble" (John 16:33). The Darkness is real, and it is deep.

It's just that it does not negate the light. The burdens do not cancel the blessings. The sorrows don't even equal the celebrations. God always makes life, and He always makes life worth it. The Good Giver of Life also accompanies each one as the Almighty Lord of "my power is made perfect in weakness" (2 Corinthians 12:9). The crucifixion forgiveness of Jesus Christ proves that He constantly populates the adversities themselves with delights.

However compromised—and we all are—every neighbor embodies a gift. However imperfect, every day comes as opportunity and privilege. They usually require patience and persistence, of course, and not a little bit of shared sweat and tears. But they turn out the sweeter for it. "When she has delivered the baby, she no longer remembers the anguish, for joy that a human being has been born into the world" (John 16:21). "Take heart; I have overcome the world" (John 16:33)!

#### Introduction

The Beatitudes are positioned at the beginning of Jesus' Sermon on the Mount, which runs from chapters five through seven of the Gospel according to Saint Matthew. These are some of the most beloved words of Jesus, and because they are part of the traditional texts for All Saints' Day each year, they are also well known to pastors and congregations.

In them, Jesus highlights people in various stations of life, situations that are not always easy to envision as a child of God. And yet, our Lord calls each of them "blessed" and assures them of their place in the kingdom of heaven eternally. It is for this reason that some have misinterpreted the Beatitudes as Jesus' instructions for Christian living. The Beatitudes, however, are not goals for which to aim, but the constant reminder of God's blessing upon His people wherever and however they may serve in this life.

Perhaps most importantly, the Beatitudes, and the whole of the Sermon on the Mount, are a picture of the gracious activity of Jesus Christ himself. In meekness and lowliness of heart, Christ hungered and thirsted for His righteousness to be manifest in us, and so in the face of persecution unto death, He has blessed us and given to us the kingdom of heaven, making peace between the Father and us forever.

As you hear these precious words from our Lord, may you indeed be blessed and encouraged in your life of faith. Most importantly, may your mind be drawn to the work of Christ and all that He has done by His life, death, and resurrection to bless you each day until He brings you home to the kingdom of heaven forever.
