From the Desk of Pastor Conrath

Why Latin?

This summer I will be offering an introduction to Latin class here at St. Peter's. It will be for all ages. I believe that it will be accessible for 7 year olds-97 year olds (currently our oldest member).

Maybe you don't think Latin is important; or remember hearing it is a dead language.

The Christian Church conducted herself in Latin for well over 1,000 years. This was true during Martin Luther's lifetime and beyond. In the Augsburg Confession we read, "Falsely are our churches accused of abolishing the Mass; for the Mass is retained among us, and celebrated with the highest reverence. Nearly all the usual ceremonies are also preserved, save that the parts sung in Latin are interspersed here and there with German hymns, which have been added to teach the people" (AC XXIV 1-4). Those words were originally written in Latin and German. Many parts of the service continued in Latin for over 200 years after Luther's death.

Latin schools were retained and Latin was taught in most schools throughout the Christian West (public schools too) into the 20th Century. Up until the last few decades Latin was required for a man studying to be a pastor in our church body.

Latin is an integral part of Classical Education. As such, we learn it in our (homeschool) academy.

Memoria Press gives the following reasons for learning Latin:

- 1.) Latin is the next step after phonics.
- 2.) Half of our English vocabulary is made up of Latin words and roots.
- 3.) Latin provides the root words for all of the modern sciences.
- 4.) Latin is the language of law, government, logic, and theology.
- 5.) Latin is the most efficient way to learn English grammar.
- 6.) Latin is the best preparation for learning any language. [Latin is the linguistic base of most European languages including Spanish]
- 7.) Latin effectively develops and trains the mind.
- 8.) Latin aids the mind in other ways.
- 9.) Latin is transformative.
- 10.) Latin is the language of Western Civilization.

I will be teaching *Prima Latina* published by Memoria Press. Unless otherwise persuaded, I plan to offer the class on Monday and Thursday mornings from 10-11am. We will cover a lesson each time. It will run between Memorial Day and Labor Day. I plan to begin Thursday May 28th. Please let me know if you are interested. Cost is for materials. Student workbook price is \$17.90 (+tax & shipping). Copy books and practice sheets are also available for extra cost. Having or making flash cards is most beneficial. 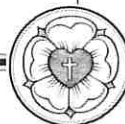

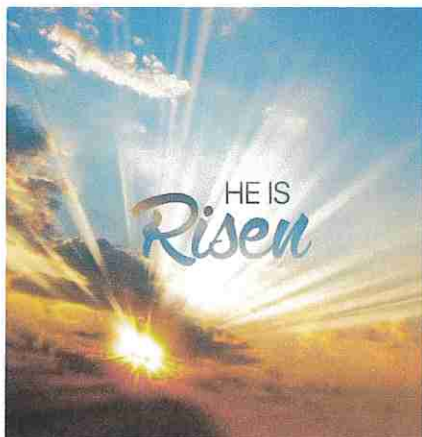

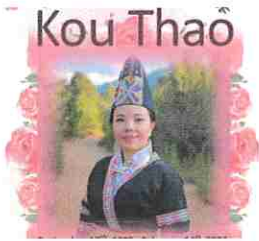

**Kou Thao**

Dear members of St. Peter's Lutheran Church in Waterford,

On behalf of my dear brother Rev. Moua Vang and his wife Kou Thao, I would like to thank you for your support for them in these last few months. They

have been through a lot. Kou received a Breast Cancer diagnosis a little more than a year ago. Despite all of the treatments that she received, the tumors continued to grow. Our Lord called her on February 14. Her funeral was on March 8 and 9 from Benediction. Hmong funerals are very elaborate. About 400 people attended. We had three services and needed to feed the guests twice. A Hmong funeral is generally in excess of \$50,000. Much of Sunday was filled with tributes to her from various individuals and groups from 9 am – 11 pm. Two of the most moving tributes were from a group of over 35 young women that she helped to mentor in ESL, GED, driving, citizenship, and other classes. At the time when she was diagnosed, she had 30 Hmong children in our Sunday School, two of which sang, "This Little Light of Mine." There were also some heartbreaking times, such as watching their 4 year old son weep, as her body was laid to rest. There are several posts on our Benediction Facebook site about the day, which describe the impact that she had.

Pastor Moua also has severe health issues. He is currently on kidney dialysis and is awaiting a kidney transplant. You can imagine their medical bills after this and a year of cancer care. Your generosity has been a great blessing.

Despite all of this, the Hmong ministry has grown in the last year, like never before. I have never witnessed two people give every ounce of their strength like these two faithful servants of the Lord in order to share the love of our Lord in both word and deed. It is a testimony that we are the church militant. The devil throws all that he can at us. Yet, we know that the victory is ours through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Thank you so much again for your love in action and truth (1 Jn 3:18) by your help for these dear servants of our Lord.

## RECIPE

### Baked Spaghetti

- 1 – 16 oz. pkg spaghetti
- 1 Tbsp. butter
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 1 cup chopped green pepper
- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 – 28 oz. can diced tomatoes
- 1 – 4 oz can mushrooms, drained
- ½ can ripe olives, sliced
- 2 tsp. dried oregano
- 2 cups shredded cheddar cheese
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- ½ cup water
- Parmesan cheese, shredded

Grease a 9x13 pan. Cook spaghetti according to package directions. In large skillet, heat butter. Sauté onion and green pepper until tender. Add ground beef until browned. Drain. Stir in tomatoes, mushrooms, olives and oregano. Bring to a boil & reduce heat to simmer. Simmer for 10 minutes.

Place one half of spaghetti in baking dish. Top with half of the meat mixture, then half of the shredded cheddar cheese. Repeat.

Combine mushroom soup with water and pour over casserole. Sprinkle with parmesan cheese. Bake uncovered @ 350 degrees for 35-40 minutes.

## MEMORIAL AND BEQUEST FUND SYNOPSIS

- Memorial and Bequest Fund was established with congregational vote in September 1962.
- Consists of donations to St. Peter's Church for special and general charitable purposes by any donor, "excepting any funds which shall be donated or designated for current or annual budgetary expenses." (Ref. Church Constitution - Article Ten, Section 1).
- Annual fund earnings are distributed as follows: 10% of the earnings are added back to the fund principal; the greater of 10%, or \$5,000, of the earnings is added to an Emergency Relief account for unforeseen special needs; the balance of the earnings is designated for distribution to LCMS and other Lutheran and charitable needs.
- Distributions from the annual authorized earnings is determined by the Memorial and Bequest Committee and the Church Council with subsequent congregational voter approval.
- Spending from the Emergency Relief account is requested and approved by the Church Council.
- The distribution of donations which remain undesignated by the donor for a period beyond twelve months are approved by the Council and congregational voters.
- Spending of any of the fund's principal (corpus) requires approval by 67% of all voting members of the congregation, and then, approval of the Church Council members and Memorial and Bequest Committee members meeting in joint session.
- Historically, the Memorial and Bequest Committee has invested monies from the Fund in a very conservative manner with the focus on preserving the principal of the Fund. Also, the Committee invests with the intent of helping the physical growth of God's kingdom by investing approximately 25% of available funds in the Lutheran Church Extension Fund.
- Over the life of the fund, earnings from interest and dividends are near \$830,000. Following is partial listing of organizations, groups and individuals who have benefited from the annual earning distributions.

# Die Akademische

A brief sketch of my education and its significance

I would like to speak briefly to the importance of classical education through my education, and my preparation as a part of the Pre-Seminary Program and the Classical Education Program. My education is one that can only be properly called “hodge-podge.” Being the eldest son of Lutheran pastor, I have moved around several times, which has given me a unique perspective concerning education. I have attended public schools, a private Lutheran parochial school, and finally, I was classically homeschooled. The first two options were very lacking in many ways, but especially because they employ educational philosophies that are by nature anti-Christian, but to address the philosophy of education is beyond the scope of this essay.

In short, there were many issues with the first two which came to light during 2020 when the schools forced us to be online. It was then when my parents saw the issues and began classically homeschooling us. The method my family uses is different than what many would consider typical homeschooling. My family does a micro-school model meeting at the church. Starting with chapel at 9 A.M., my siblings are actively taught various subjects by my parents in turn based on the subject. The school day usually ends around 1 P.M. or 2 P.M.. With this model, one could grow from a micro-school into a full-fledged classical academy

which serves the church by raising children centered around the Word with teachers who hold the Lutheran Confessions and Biblical morality. It is very challenging to educate your children in the Lutheran Confessions and Biblical virtue outside of a classical Lutheran classroom.

## For Further Thought

But should one demand that a Lutheran education can only be properly classical? Yes, for a classical education upholds an ability to understand the world and to understand the Scripture that our Confessions to a certain extent demand. A thought to ponder: “The Reformation would have failed without classical education in the University of Wittenberg.”





Now that you have some background to my childhood education, I would like to turn to my present education. Largely, I am a student of the Trivium (Grammar, Logic, and Rhetoric). I have dived headfirst into the world of classical languages. I have learned Latin. I am learning Greek, and I will learn Hebrew. The languages are priceless for an education for they both inform you of grammar, but they shape your mind to structure your thoughts better, to argue stronger, and to be able to read books in their source language (*ad fontes*). I also study a lot of Philosophy which in a simple sense is the history of thought from antiquity to today. This dual study of the languages and philosophy prepares me to teach both in the parish and at a classical school because by knowing how to learn (philosophy) and how to speak (learned by means of the languages), I will be apt to teach. Yet, let me not discount the importance of the Quadrivium (Arithmetic, Geometry, Astronomy, and Music). This has not been neglected in my education either, for it is also crucial to the formation of the person, for it is by these that your critical thinking and appreciation of God's world abounds. I have found this crucial to my development in college as well because by engaging in the Quadrivium, I am equipped myself to teach wholistically about the Liberal Arts. This is just a general overview of my formation in my collegiate Liberal Arts education at Concordia—University Wisconsin.

I could speak for a long time concerning the benefits of classical education, but this should suffice to show how I progressed to classical education, though I did not begin in a classical model. A classical Lutheran education is what our children need. They need to be able to think critically, to be able to discern good from evil, and to delight in what is Good, True, and Beautiful in the world. Our children need to be enveloped in Lutheran culture in a classical Lutheran school singing our Lutheran hymnody and liturgy, being conformed to be virtuous, and to be confessing Christ, the crucified one.

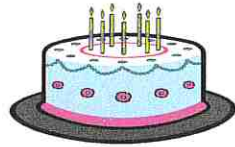

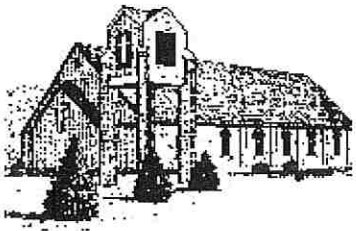
